# Shift, change, and carry on

Branches opened, branches closed, services adjusted, and staff responded to all of the plot twists and turns the COVID-19 pandemic threw their way in 2021. But despite all the ups and downs, one thing that remained constant was the Library's commitment to respond to the needs of the public in creative and innovative ways.

- While branches were closed to browsing, staff invited patrons to 'window browse' by setting up window displays patrons could safely explore.
- Once open, staff recognized that not everyone would feel comfortable visiting us indoors and ensured that curbside services remained an option.
- Technology became more important than ever to keep us connected. For those who needed extra support using their technology, the Library was there to help with Virtual Tech Time services.

# A modern, new look

The Huron County Library underwent a rebranding in early 2021 to modernize the overall look of the Library. The new logo fully reflects the inclusivity, vibrancy and creativity found at all 12 branches.

The new Library logo features a modern design that utilizes a classic book cover shape. A conversation bubble at the heart of the logo illustrates the Library as a place for people, ideas and conversations. The vibrant colour palette used in the logo design features 12 colour blocks that represent each of the Library's branch locations.

This colour palette is shared by other County of Huron brands, including the Huron County Museum and Historic Gaol, and Ontario's West Coast.

## Highlights of the rebranding include:

- A stronger, more consistent presence on social media with colourful designs to draw attention to all the Library has to offer
- An improved, more accessible online presence with the development of a new Library website, launched in early 2022
- The redesign of Library cards, and staff name tags and business cards
- Improved branch signage featuring more accessible font usage and unique identifying colours for each branch

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

# Library from home

Whether the Huron County Library's branches were open or closed, patrons could still easily access library services from the safety and comfort of home.

- All Library online resources were available to Huron County Library card holders anytime and anywhere! Patrons could access movies, e-books, audiobooks, magazines, music, genealogy resources, and more all from home.
- For those without internet at home, parking lot wifi was available at all branches and patrons could also borrow the internet with our wifi hubs. Wifi hubs were checked out 405 times through 2021.
- While in-person programming was not possible, virtual programming provided access to a variety of learning opportunities for all ages and interests. Library spaces have traditionally provided places for people to connect with one another and, while online is not always the same, virtual programs also provided the chance for patrons to connect with one another over shared interests. Programs explored gardening, cooking, writing, travel, science, storytimes, and author talks.

# A place where we belong

At the Huron County Library, everyone is welcome! Even as branches were closed to the public, staff worked hard to find unique ways to help make people feel welcomed and supported in our communities.

- To celebrate the diversity in our communities, staff frequently shared reading recommendations to help expand our understanding of one another. Highlights from our collection were shared to honour Black History Month, Pride Month, Ramadan, National Indigenous History Month, and more.
- Library branches painted the County the colours of the rainbow to celebrate Pride Month in June. All branches showed their support for our LGBTQ2S+ community with creative window decorations and book displays.
- In celebration of Newcomer Welcoming Week, the Library partnered with the Huron County Immigration Partnership to present author readings, distribute Welcome to the Neighbourhood bags, and create vibrant, inviting window displays.
- National Day for Truth and Reconciliation was celebrated for the first time on Sept. 30. Staff commemorated the day by wearing orange shirts to honour the lost children and survivors of residential schools.

In celebration of Newcomer Welcoming Week, newcomers to Canada and to Huron County were invited to pick up a 'Welcome to the Neighbourhood' bag from their local branch.



Staff commemorated National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day to honour children who survived residential schools and to remember those who did not.



# Stronger together

Together we can do great things for our communities and it was a pleasure to work closely with several community partners to provide learning opportunities and activities for all ages and interests.

- Huron County sewers were invited to support the Exeter Fidget Makers who were looking to expand their fidget apron project across the County. The aprons support Alzheimers and Dementia patients and include activities to help stimulate brain activity. Sewing kits were distributed through all Library branches to help sewers add to the more than 1,500 aprons that have been made and donated to local long-term care homes and individuals to date.
- While schools remained closed in June, we partnered with the Foundation for Education to support their Paintings on the Pavement campaign through Pride month through the distribution of sidewalk chalk. School-aged children were invited to create chalk drawings that promote inclusivity and celebrate our LGBTQ2S+ community.
- Scientists in School helped us bring virtual, hands-on science programs to young scientists across the County.
- Maitland Valley Conservation Authority provided snowshoes our patrons could borrow to get out and get active through the winter.
- Ausable Bayfield Conservation Authority supported our Seed Library by leading a virtual series of workshops to help patrons get growing.

In the fall of 2021, the Huron County Library's Alice Munro Branch received a pleasant surprise in the mail when a long-lost library book was returned to the branch. Sigmund Freud's *A General Introduction to Psychoanalysis* found its way home after being checked out in the 1970s!

An accompanying letter from the borrower shared how the book was lost, then found, and potentially led to a career in psychoanalysis.

"I like to think that unconsciously when I borrowed, read, then lost this book from the town library, that the seed was already planted to only fully grow nearly 40 years later," the borrower wrote. The letter and book have been on display at the Alice Munro Branch since its return.



Dear Librarian,

I grew up in Wingham. In the late 1970's I borrowed the enclosed book (Freud, S., (1963) *A General Introduction to Psychoanalysis*) from the library. Unfortunately when it was time to return it, I could not find it and ended up paying the Library for it. A few years later I found it under the seat of my car which was heading to Marks' Bros. Wreckers. Unconsciously I must have wanted to retain it! This was at a time when my high school guidance counsellors and a math teacher were telling me I "wasn't smart enough" and "wasn't university material".

My subsequent education through Photography at Fanshawe College, an Honours Physiology degree at Western, medical school at Ottawa, Family Medicine at McMaster, Psychiatry at Western, I have proven them wrong. My original plan after practising for a few years in Northern Ontario, was to return to Wingham as a Family Physician and work with Drs. Corrin and McKim. Sadly they both died before I could enact that plan, and various things led me to a career in Psychiatry. This led me eventually to become a psychoanalyst at the Toronto Psychoanalytic Institute.

I like to think that unconsciously when I borrowed, read, then lost this book from the town library, that the seed was already planted to only fully grow nearly 40 years later. Recently, given the psychoanalytic library I now own, including the complete 24 volume Standard Edition of Freud's writings, it was time to return this volume to its home. Perhaps it will inspire someone in the next generation of psychoanalysts with Wingham origins.

Thank you for indulging my tale and accepting this precious volume.
